Strengthening of security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region

Report of the First Committee

I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. The item entitled "Strengthening of security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region" was included in the agenda of the forty-first session in accordance with General Assembly resolution 40/157 of 16 December 1985.
- 2. At its 3rd plenary meeting, on 20 September 1986, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee, decided to include the item in its agenda and to allocate it to the First Committee.
- 3. The First Committee considered item 67 jointly with items 68, 69 and 141 at its 52nd to 59th meetings, from 20, 21 and 24 to 26 November 1986 (see A/C.1/41/PV.52-59).

II. CONSICERATION OF DRAFT PROPOSALS

Draft resolutions A/C.1/41/L.90 and Rev.1

5. On 21 November, Algeria, Cyprus, the <u>Libyan Arab Jamahiriya</u>, <u>Malta, Morocco, Romania</u>, <u>Tunisia</u> and <u>Yugoslavia</u> submitted a draft resolution, entitled "Strengthening of security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region" (A/C.1/41/L.90), which read as follows:

"The General Assembly,

"Recalling its resolutions 36/102 of 9 December 1981, 37/118 of
1. December 1982, 38/189 of 20 December 1983, 39/153 of 17 December 1984 and
40/157 of 16 December 1985.

"Recognizing the importance of promoting peace, security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region and of strengthening further the economic, commercial and cultural links in the region,

"Expressing concern over persistent and increasing tension in parts of the Mediterranean region and the consequent threat to peace,

"<u>Deeply concerned</u> at the recent extension of military operations to new areas of the Mediterranean and the grave danqers which these create for peace, security and general equilibrium in the region,

"Considering, in this regard, the urgency for all Staten to conform in their actions to the purposes and principles of the Charter of the United Nat Ions, as well as to the provisions of the Declaration on Principles of' International Law concerning Friendly Relations and Co-operation among States in accordance with the Charter of the United Nations, 1/

"Considering also the necessity to intensify efforts towards the promotion of peace, security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region,

"Reaffirming the need to promote security and to strengthen co-operation in the region, as provided for in the Mediterranean chapter of the Final. Act of the Conference on Security and Co-operation in Europe, signed at Helsinki on 1 August 1975,

"Recalling the declarations of successive meatings of non-aligned countries concerning the Mediterranean, as well as official declarations on, and contributions to, peace and security in the Mediterranean region made by individual countries,

<u>Reaffirming</u> the primary role of Mediterranean countries in the promotion of security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region,

"Recalling, in this connection, the Final Declaration adopted at Valletta on 11 September 1984 by the Mediterranean members—the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries, 2/ and the commitments assumed by the participants with the objective of contributing to peace and security in the region,

"Welcoming the efforts realized by the Mediterranean members of the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries to strengthen regional co-operation in various fields among themselves and between them and the European countries,

"Takinoto of the adoption by the Conference on Confidence- and Security-Building Measures and Disarmament in Europe of the document of the Stockholm Conference on concrete, militarily significant, politically binding and verifiable confidence- and security-huilding measures,

"Taking note of the desire of the Mediterranean countries to launch a process of European-Mediterranean consultation on security questions,

"Taking note also of the debate on this item during the various sessions Of the General Assembly, and, in particular, of the report hy the Secretary-General on this item,

"1. Reaffirms:

- "(a) That the security of the Mediterranean is closely I inked with European security and with international peace and security;
- "(b) That further efforts are necessary for the reduction of tension and of armaments and for the creation of conditions of security and fruitful co-operation in all fields for all countries and peoples of the Mediterranean, on the basis of the principles of sovereignty, independence, territorial

integrity, security, non-intervention and non-interference, non-violation of international borders, non-use of force or threat of use of force, the inadmissibility of the acquisition of territory by force, peaceful settlement of disputes and respect for permanent sovereignty over natural resources,

- "(c) The need for just and viable solutions of existing problems and crises in the area on the basis of the provisions of the Charter and of relevant resolutions of the United Nations, the withdrawal of foreign forces of occupation and the right of people8 under colonial or foreign domination to self-determination and independence1
- Takes note of paragraph 24 of the Scockholm document of the Stockholm Conference on confidence—and security-building measures and disarmament in Europe which inter alia confirms the intension of the CSCE participants to develop good-neighbourly relations with all States of the region, with due regard to reciprocity, and in the spirit of the principles contained in the Rtclaration on Principles, guiding relations between participating States, so as to promote confidence and security and make peace prevail in the region in accordance with the provisions contained in the Mediterranean chapter of the Final Act;
- "3. Welcomes any further communication to the Secretary-General, from all States, of proposals, declarations and recommendations on otrengthening peace, security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region;
- "4. Urges all States to co-operate with the Mediterranean States in the further efforts required to reduce tension and promote peace, security and co-operation in the region in accordance with the purposes and principles of the Charter of the United Nations and with the provisions of the Declaration on Principles of International Law concerning Friendly Relations and Co-operation among States in accardance with the Charter of the United Nations:
- "5. Encourages once again efforts to intensify existing forms and to promote new forms of co-operation in various fields, particularly those aimed at reducing tension and strengthening confidence and security in the region;
- *6. Renews its invitation to the Secretary-General to give due attention to the question of peace, security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region, and, if requested to do so, to render advice and assistance to concerted efforts by Mediterranean countries in promoting peace, security and co-operation in the region;
- "7. <u>Invites</u> the member States of the relevant regional organizations to lend support and to submit to the Secretary-General concrete ideas and suggestions on their potential contribution to the strengthening of peace and co-operation in the Mediterranean region;
- "8. Requests the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly at its for ty-second sess ion, on the basis of all replies received and notifications submitted in the implementation of the present resolution and,

taking into account the debate on this question during its forty-first session, an updated report on the etrenqthening of security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region;

- "9. Decides to include in the provisional agenda of its forty-second session the item entitled 'Strengthening of security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region'."
- 6. On 25 November, Algeria, Cyprus, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, Malta, Morocco, Romania, Tunisia and Yuqoelavia submitted a revised draft resolution entitled "Strengthening of security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region" (A/C.1/41/L.90/Rev.1), which was introduced by the representative of Malta at the 59th meeting, on 26 November.
- 7. At the same meeting, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.1/41/L.90/Rev.1 without a vote (see pars. 8).

III. RECOMMENDATION OF THE FIRST COMMITTEE

a. The First Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the following resolutiont

Strengthening of security and co-operation in the Mcditerranean region

The Ger ral Assembly,

Recalling its resolutions 36/102 of 9 December 1981, 37/118 of 16 December 1982, 38/189 of 20 December 1983, 39/153 of 17 December 1984 and 40/157 of 16 December 1985.

Recognizing the importance of promoting peace, security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region and of strengthening turther the economic, commercial and cultural links in the region,

Expressing concern. at the persistent and increasing tension in parts of the Mediterranean region and the consequent threat to peace,

Deeply concerned at the continuing military operations in the Mediterrarean and the grave dangers 'hat these create for peace, security and general equilibrium in the region,

Consider inq, in this regard, the urgency for all States to conform in their-actions to the purposes and principles of the Charter of the United Natione, au well as to the provisions of the Declaration on Principles of International Law concerning Friendly Relations and Co-operation among States In accordance with the Charter of the United Nations, 1/

<u>Considering also</u> the necessity to intensify efforts towards the promotion of peace, security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region,

Reaffirming the need to promote security and to atrangthen co-operation in the region, as provided for in the Mediterranean chapter of the Final Act of the Conference on Security and Co-operation in Europe, signed at Helsinki on 1 August 1975, 3/

Recalling the doclaration of successive meetings of non-aligned countries concerning the Mediterranean, au well as official declarations on, and contributions to, peace and security in the Mediterranean region made by individual countries,

Reaffirming the primary role of Mediterranean countries in the promotion of security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region,

Recalling, in this connection, the Final Declaration adopted at Valletta on 11 September 1984 by the Mediterranean members of the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries, 2/ and the commitments assumed by the participants with the objective of contributing to peace and security in the region,

Welcoming the efforts realized by the Mediterranean members of the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries to strengthen regional co-operation in var ious fields among themselves and between them and the European countries,

Taking note of the adoption by the Stockholm Conference on Confidenceand Security-build .ng Measures and Disarmament in Europe of the document of the Stockholm Conference on concrete, militarily significant, politically binding and ver if table confidence- and security-building measures,

Taking note of the desire of the non-aligned Mediterranean countries to launch a process of conaultations with the European-Mediterranean and other European countries on peace, security and co-operation in the region,

Taking note also of the debate on thin item during the var ious sessions of the General Assembly, and, in particular, of the report of the Secretary-General on this item, 4/

- (b) That further efforts are necessary for the reduction of teneion and of armaments and for the creation of conditions of secut !ty and fruitful co-operation in all fields for all countries and peoples of the Mediterranean, on the basis of the principles of sovereigney, independence, territorial integrity, security, non-intervention and non-interference, non-violation of international borders, non-use of force or threat of use of force, the inadmissibility of the acquisition of territory by force, peaceful settlement of disputes and respect for permanent covereignty over natural r sources;
- (c) The need for just and viable solutions of existing problems and crises in the area on the basis of the provisions of the Charter and of relevant readlutione of the United Nations, the withdrawal of foreign forces of occupation and the right of peoples under colonial or foreign domination to self-determination and independence,
- 2. Takes note of paragraph 24 of the document of the Stockholm Conference on Confidence— and Security-building Measures and Disarmament in Europe, which, inter alia, confirms the intention of the participants in the Conference on Security and (V-operation in Europe to develop good-neighbourly relations with all States the region, with due regard to reciprocity, and in the spirit of the principles contained in the Declaration on Principles, guiding relations between participating Statca, so as to promote confidence and security and make peace prevail in the region in accordance with the provisions contained in the Mediterranean chapter of the Final Act;

- 5. Encourages once again efforts to intensify existing forms and to promote new forms of co-operation in various fields, particularly those aimed at reducing tension and strengthening confidence and security in the region;
- 6. Renews its invitation to the Secretary-General to give due attention to the question of peace, security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region and, if teauested to do so, to render advice and assistance to concerted efforts by Mediterranean countries in promoting peace, security and co-operation in the region;
- 7. <u>Invites</u> the States members of the relevant regional organizations to lend support and to submit to the Secretary-General concrete ideas and suggestions on their potential contribution to the strengthenian of peace and co-operation in the Mediterranean region;

- 8. Requests the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly at its forty-second session, on the basis of all replies received and notifications submitted in the implementation of the present resolution and taking into account the debate on thin question during its forty-first session, an updated report on the strengthening of Recur ity and co-operation in the Mediterranean region;
- 9. <u>Decides</u> to include in the provisional agenda of its forty-second session the item entitled "Strengthening of security and co-operation in the Mediterranean region".
