Extensions of ongoing country programmes

Note by the secretariat

Summary

In accordance with Executive Board decision 2009/11, this note informs the Executive Board of the two-month extension of the country programme for Jordan; the six-month extension of the country programme for South Sudan; the first one-year extensions of the country programmes for the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Equatorial Guinea, Lesotho, Liberia, Nicaragua, the Syrian Arab Republic and Zambia; and the first one-year extension of the Gulf Area subregional programme (Bahrain, Kuwait, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates), all approved by the Executive Director.

The note further presents the reasons for the proposed two-month extensions of the country programmes for Cabo Verde, Ghana and Mauritania, following one-year extensions; the proposed one-year extension of the country programme for Libya, following three one-year extensions; the proposed 15-month extension of the country programme for South Africa; and the proposed two-year extension of the country programme for Yemen, following two one-year extensions. The Executive Board is requested to approve these programme extensions.

The Executive Board

1. *Takes note* of the two-month extension of the country programme for Jordan; the six-month extension of the country programme for South Sudan; the first one-year extensions of the country programmes for the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Equatorial Guinea, Lesotho, Liberia, Nicaragua, the Syrian Arab Republic and Zambia; and the first one-year extension of the Gulf Area subregional programme (Bahrain, Kuwait, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates), which were approved by the Executive Director and are presented in table 1.

2. *Approves* the two-month extensions of the country programmes for Cabo Verde, Ghana and Mauritania, following one-year extensions; the one-year extension of the country programme for Libya, following three one-year extensions; the 15-month extension of the country programme for South Africa; and the two-year extension of the country programme for Yemen, following two one-year extensions, as presented in table 2.
