## Overview

- 4.1 General and complete disarmament under strict and effective international control remains the ultimate goal of all efforts exerted in the field of disarmament. The main responsibilities for disarmament lie with Member States. The United Nations, in accordance with its Charter, has a central role and primary responsibility in supporting Member States in this area. The Department for Disarmament Affairs is responsible for the implementation of the programme.
- 4.2 The activities for which the Department for Disarmament Affairs is responsible fall within the framework of programme 3, Disarmament, of the biennial programme plan for the period 2006-2007. The mandate for the programme derives from priorities established in General Assembly resolutions and decisions in the field of disarmament, including the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session of the General Assembly devoted to disarmament (resolution S-10/2). The programme is also guided by the United Nations Millennium Declaration (General Assembly resolution 55/2) and takes into account other relevant resolutions of the United Nations. While weapons of mass destruction, in particular nuclear weapons, continue to be the primary concern, the Organization will also continue its work in the field of conventional disarmament.
- 4.3 For the biennium 2006-2007, the Department will continue to facilitate the process of multilateral deliberation and negotiation. It will assist Member States in promoting, strengthening and consolidating multilaterally negotiated principles and norms in all areas of disarmament. Attention will also be given to efforts of Member States in the area of disarmament and non-proliferation in order to help maintain international peace and security and to contribute to global efforts against terrorism. The Department will promote and facilitate the implementation of the Programme of Action adopted at the United Nations Conference on the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects, as well as practical disarmament measures. It will also promote transparency and confidence-building measures and will expand its outreach activities, including through its website, to ensure the flow of impartial and factual information to the public. The Department will implement disarmament and non-proliferation education programmes, and will continue to encourage the exchange of information on and experience in disarmament and security-related matters among organizations of the United Nations system, Member States, other intergovernmental organizations, regional organizations and non-governmental organizations and to enhance interaction and cooperation on such matters. It will also assist Member States in promoting regional approaches to disarmament and security, including through the regional centres for peace and disarmament. It will continue to contribute to efforts to enhance disarmament expertise in Member States, particularly developing countries.
- 4.4 The Department will seek to achieve the objectives of the programme by providing substantive organizational support to deliberative and negotiating bodies and their subsidiary bodies, as well as review conferences, other meetings of States parties to multilateral agreements on disarmament and related matters and expert groups assisting the Secretary-General in undertaking disarmament studies. This will include monitoring and assessing current and future trends in the field of disarmament and international security.
- 4.5 Training and advisory services will continue to be provided, through the United Nations disarmament fellowship, training and advisory services programme and the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research, to Member States, in particular developing countries, to enhance their expertise in disarmament, with a view to participating more effectively in international deliberating and negotiating forums. The Department will also assist Member States in increasing their understanding of the relationship between disarmament and development.
- 4.6 The Department carries out its activities in cooperation with other departments and offices of the Secretariat, entities of the United Nations system and entities external to the United Nations,

including treaty organizations, intergovernmental, interregional, regional and national organizations, non-governmental organizations, academic communities, etc. Such cooperation includes the preparation of reports, participation in meetings, briefings, technical and substantive support and sharing of information and experience.

- 4.7 Gender mainstreaming will continue to be built into the activities of the programme through the implementation of a gender plan of action aimed at raising awareness, commitment and capacity for gender mainstreaming in disarmament affairs. This will include encouraging Member States to nominate more female candidates for expert groups, the disarmament fellowship programme and other meetings and events organized by the Department, as well as focusing on gender perspectives in the area of disarmament.
- 4.8 The expected accomplishments and indicators of achievement for the Department in the biennium 2006-2007 are detailed, together with resources under executive direction and management and the programme of work. The overall framework of these expected accomplishments and indicators of achievement is shown in table 4.1.

- 4.9 The issue of publications as a part of the programme of work has been reviewed in the context of each subprogramme. It is anticipated that recurrent and non-recurrent publications will be issued as shown in table 4.2 below in summary and as distributed in the output information for each subprogramme.

- 4.10 The overall level of resources for the Department for Disarmament Affairs for the biennium 2006-2007 amounts to \$18,749,800, at 2004-2005 rates, reflecting growth of \$9,900 (0.1 per cent). The growth in table 4.4 can be summarized as follows:

- (a) The net decrease of \$12,000 under executive direction and management relates to reduced requirements in non-post items;
  - (b) The net decrease of \$35,700 under programme of work relates to:
    - (i) A decrease of \$184,000 under subprogramme 1 resulting from the abolition of a General Service (Other level) post;
    - (ii) A net decrease of \$52,300 under subprogramme 2 comprising a reduction in non-post requirements (\$219,800) due to fewer ad hoc expert group meetings, partially offset by the delayed impact of a new post (P-5) established in the biennium 2004-2005 (\$167,500);
    - (iii) A net increase of \$2,500 under subprogramme 3 comprising \$185,800 for a new P-5 post, partially offset by a net decrease in non-post requirements of \$183,300 due mainly to the discontinuation of one-time requirements for 2004-2005;
    - (iv) An increase of \$93,000 under subprogramme 4 for non-post requirements in connection with a panel of experts mandated under General Assembly resolution 59/60 of 3 December 2004;
    - (v) A net increase of \$105,100 under subprogramme 5 comprising an increase of \$226,900 for the delayed impact of a new post (D-1) established in the biennium 2004-2005, offset by a reduction of \$121,800 for one-time provisions for the strengthening of safety and security in 2004-2005;
  - (c) The increase of \$57,600 under programme support for non-post requirements is due to the implementation of a cost-sharing mechanism to finance the cost of central data-processing infrastructure services and support.
- 4.11 The estimated extrabudgetary resources, amounting to \$7,309,500, include the amount of \$3,055,400 for the trust fund for the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR).
- 4.12 Pursuant to General Assembly resolution 58/269 of 23 December 2003, resources identified for the conduct of monitoring and evaluation would amount to \$223,200 (reflected under executive direction and management and all subprogrammes).
- 4.13 The percentage distribution of resources under this section is as shown in table 4.3.

## A. Policymaking organs: Conference on Disarmament

### *Resource requirements (before recosting): \$47,300*

- 4.15 The Conference on Disarmament was set up in accordance with paragraph 120 of the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session of the General Assembly (resolution S-10/2) as the single multilateral disarmament negotiating forum of the international community. Following the expansions of its membership in 1996 and 1999, the Conference is open to the five nuclear-weapon States and 60 other States, including key militarily significant States. In addition, every year some 40 non-member States are invited, upon their request, to participate in its work. The Conference on Disarmament conducts its work by consensus, adopts its own rules of procedure, rotates its presidency among all its members every four weeks, adopts its own agenda taking into account the recommendations made to it by the General Assembly and the proposals presented by the members of the Conference, and submits a report to the General Assembly annually, or more frequently as appropriate. The Conference divides its 24-week annual session into three parts and, if necessary, continues its negotiations on priority issues between sessions. Meetings thus may take place during six to nine months each year.
- 4.16 Pursuant to paragraph 120 (c) of the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session of the General Assembly, the Secretary-General, following consultations with the Conference on Disarmament, appoints the Secretary-General of the Conference, who also acts as his Personal Representative, to assist the Conference and its Presidents in organizing the Conference. As requested by the Assembly in its resolution 34/83 L of 11 December 1979, the Secretary-General provides staff, as well as the assistance and services needed by the Conference on Disarmament and any subsidiary bodies that it might establish, in accordance with the arrangements contained in its rules of procedure. The secretariat of the Conference consists of officers of the Conference on

Disarmament secretariat and Conference Support Branch (Geneva) of the Department for Disarmament Affairs.

- 4.17 The Conference on Disarmament successfully concluded the negotiation of the Convention on the Prohibition of the Development, Production, Stockpiling and Use of Chemical Weapons and on Their Destruction (1992) and the Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban Treaty (1996), with the participation of all five nuclear-weapon States and other militarily significant States. The Conference is currently conducting a comprehensive review of the priorities on the contemporary international disarmament agenda in order to reach an agreement on a programme of work, which will include deliberations and negotiations on a number of disarmament issues on its agenda.

- 4.18 The non-post resources provide for travel of Geneva-based officials to attend meetings of the General Assembly and its subsidiary bodies as well as other consultations and meetings hosted at Headquarters.

## B. Executive direction and management

**Resource requirements (before recosting): \$2,805,200**

- 4.19 Executive direction and management of the programme consists of the Office of the Under-Secretary-General and the Office of the Director.
- 4.20 The Office of the Under-Secretary-General is responsible for the implementation of the programme of work, as well as for the overall direction, supervision and management of the Department, including its financial and administrative activities. The Under-Secretary-General provides the Secretary-General with advice and support on all disarmament and related security matters, represents him in that respect, as required, and provides authoritative analysis and assessment of developments in the field of disarmament and international security for policy guidance and decision-making purposes.
- 4.21 In the exercise of his responsibilities, the Under-Secretary-General is assisted by the Director, who acts as deputy and assumes charge of the Department in the absence of the Under-Secretary-General. The Director provides support to the Under-Secretary-General on executive direction and management of the Department; ensures efficient coordination and the delivery of the programmatic mandates of the Department; and advises the Under-Secretary-General and makes recommendations on all substantive, organizational, administrative, personnel and budgetary matters. The Office of the Director is responsible for coordinating the work of the Department and its outputs. The Director is accountable to the Under-Secretary-General.

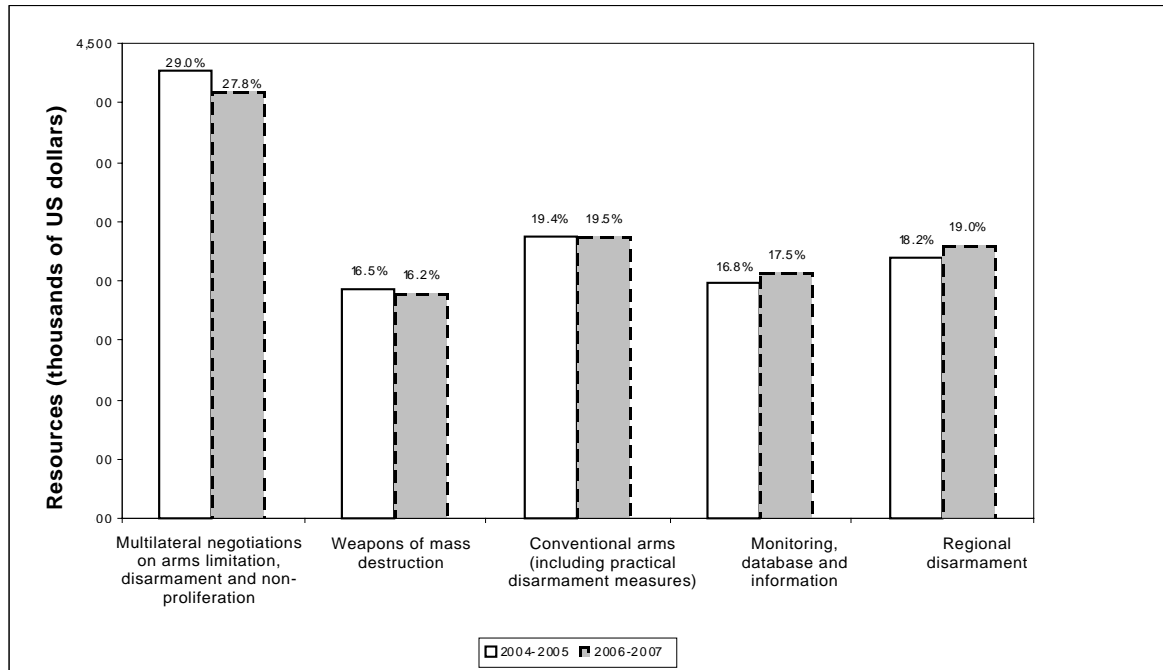

#### Subprogramme 1 Multilateral negotiations on arms limitation, disarmament and non-proliferation

**Resource requirements (before recosting): \$4,092,000**

- 4.23 The subprogramme is implemented by the Conference on Disarmament Secretariat and Conference Support Branch in Geneva, which will continue to provide substantive and organizational support to the Conference on Disarmament and to the conferences and meetings of States parties to multilateral arms limitation and disarmament agreements. The Branch will also assist Member States, in particular developing countries, in the enhancement of expertise in the field of arms limitation and disarmament through the implementation of the United Nations fellowship, training and advisory services programme. During the biennium 2006-2007, the Branch will continue providing substantive and organizational support to the Annual Meetings of States Parties to the Convention on the Prohibition of the Use, Stockpiling, Production and Transfer of Anti-Personnel Mines and on Their Destruction. The end-users of this subprogramme are Member States, States parties to multilateral disarmament agreements, intergovernmental organizations and institutions involved in arms limitation and disarmament.

### External factors

- 4.24 The subprogramme is expected to achieve its objectives and expected accomplishments on the assumption that: (a) the political environment will be supportive of disarmament efforts; (b) political developments relating to international peace and security will be conducive to facilitation of negotiations of new arms limitation and disarmament agreements; (c) negotiating parties will exercise a necessary degree of flexibility and accommodation in addressing their respective security concerns; (d) Member States will be willing to implement recommendations; and (e) national institutions will be supportive of gender balance issues.

### Outputs

- 4.25 During the biennium 2006-2007, the following final outputs will be delivered:

- 4.26 The amount of \$2,293,900, reflecting a decrease of \$184,000, will provide for the continuation of eight posts, including five in the Professional and above category and three General Service posts. The decrease relates to the proposed abolition of one General Service (Other level) post resulting from workload reduction realized through the application of information technology. The non-post resources, at the maintenance level, will provide for overtime, travel of staff, supplies, furniture and equipment and grants and contributions, including a subvention of \$476,500 to UNIDIR.

## Subprogramme 2 Weapons of mass destruction

*Resource requirements (before recosting): \$2,390,100*

- 4.27 The Weapons of Mass Destruction Branch is responsible for the implementation of the subprogramme and will carry out activities related to weapons of mass destruction, in particular nuclear weapons, as mandated by Member States. The end-users of this subprogramme are Member States, States parties to multilateral disarmament agreements and intergovernmental organizations and institutions involved in the area of weapons of mass destruction, in particular nuclear weapons.

- 4.30 The amount of \$2,013,700, reflecting a growth of \$167,500, will provide for the continuation of eight posts. The growth relates to the delayed impact of a new post (P-5) established in the biennium 2004-2005. The non-post resources will provide for other staff costs, consultants and experts and travel of staff. The decrease in non-post requirements (\$219,800) reflects lower requirements for ad hoc expert groups because fewer meetings are to be held in 2006-2007.

### Subprogramme 3 Conventional arms (including practical disarmament measures)

*Resource requirements (before recosting): \$2,871,700*

- 4.31 The Conventional Arms Branch is responsible for the implementation of the subprogramme. The primary areas to be covered are small arms and light weapons, including the operation of the Coordinating Action on Small Arms mechanism; the operation and progress of the arms transparency instruments of the United Nations on international arms transfers and military expenditures; disarmament and development; and emerging trends and developments in the field of conventional weapons. It is envisaged that in the biennium 2006-2007 the subprogramme will face new challenges and responsibilities stemming from the conclusion of the negotiations concerning the development of an international instrument to enable States to identify and trace, in a timely and reliable manner, illicit small arms and light weapons, the outcome of the United Nations Conference to review progress made in the implementation of the Programme of Action to Prevent, Combat and Eradicate the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects, the substantive servicing of governmental expert groups and other meetings in the area of conventional arms, and an increase in requests for assistance from Member States.
- 4.32 The end-users include Member States, departments and agencies within the United Nations system, regional and subregional bodies, civil society, specialized non-governmental organizations and research institutes.

- 4.35 The amount of \$2,381,700, reflecting an increase of \$185,800, will provide for the continuation of nine posts augmented by the proposed establishment of one new P-5 post. The requested new post is needed to strengthen the capacity of the Branch in providing appropriate guidance and supervision to the practical implementation of all activities related to conventional arms. The incumbent of this post will be responsible for the whole spectrum of practical disarmament issues under the mandate of the Department. The non-post requirements, reflecting a reduction of \$183,300, will provide for other staff costs, consultants, experts and travel. The decrease relates to the discontinuation of the non-recurrent requirements approved for the biennium 2004-2005 in connection with activities mandated under General Assembly resolution 58/241 of 23 December 2003 on the illicit trade in small arms and light weapons in all its aspects, partially offset by increases in other staff costs, consultants and travel due mainly to requirements relating to the 2006 review conference on the implementation of the Programme of Action to Prevent, Combat and Eradicate the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects.

## Subprogramme 4 Monitoring, database and information

*Resource requirements (before recosting): \$2,572,900*

- 4.36 The subprogramme is implemented by the Monitoring, Database and Information Branch, which will continue to provide objective, impartial and up-to-date information on multilateral disarmament issues and activities to its end-users: Member States, States parties to multilateral agreements, intergovernmental organizations and institutions, departments and agencies of the United Nations system, research and educational institutions, civil society, especially non-governmental organizations, the media and the general public.
- 4.37 Outreach activities carried out under this subprogramme cover all aspects of multilateral disarmament, with emphasis on the Department's substantive priority areas of weapons of mass destruction and conventional weapons, particularly small arms and light weapons. The Branch will continue to carry out information and education activities in coordination with the other branches and departments, most notably the Department of Public Information, as well as with civil society organizations, especially non-governmental and academic organizations. The Department will continue to foster implementation by Governments, other United Nations organizations and civil society organizations of the recommendations of the 2002 United Nations study on disarmament and non-proliferation education, and increase its own activities in this regard. The subprogramme will continue to expand its use of the electronic medium for dissemination and exchange of information with specialized web pages and e-mailing lists.

- 4.40 The amount of \$2,572,900, reflecting an increase of \$93,000, will continue to provide for eight posts and non-post resources for other staff costs, consultant and experts and travel. The increase in non-post resources (\$93,000) relates to proposed additional provisions for consultants and experts and travel of staff in connection with the panel of government experts on the question of verification in all its aspects mandated under General Assembly resolution 59/60 of 3 December 2004, which will hold two sessions in Geneva.

### Subprogramme 5 Regional disarmament

#### *Resource requirements (before recosting): \$2,801,200*

- 4.41 It has been generally recognized that regional disarmament could play a vital role in promoting and enhancing international efforts towards global disarmament. Accordingly, this subprogramme is aimed at promoting and strengthening regional and subregional initiatives with a view to promoting and strengthening international peace and security.
- 4.42 The subprogramme will be implemented by the Regional Disarmament Branch at Headquarters, the Regional Centre for Peace and Disarmament in Africa, the Regional Centre for Peace and Disarmament in Asia and the Pacific and the Regional Centre for Peace, Disarmament and Development in Latin America and the Caribbean.

### External factors

- 4.43 The subprogramme is expected to achieve its objectives and expected accomplishments on the assumption that: (a) the political environment will be supportive of disarmament efforts; (b) Member States will be willing to implement United Nations recommendations; (c) there are no major shortfalls in resources; (d) regional organizations will provide cooperation; and (e) Member States will be supportive of mainstreaming gender in disarmament, peace and security.

- 4.45 The amount of \$2,204,000, reflecting a growth of \$190,900, will provide for the continuation of nine posts. The growth relates to the delayed impact of the new post (D-1) established in the biennium 2004-2005. The non-post resources of \$597,200, reflecting a net decrease of \$85,800, will provide for other staff costs, consultants and experts and travel. The decrease is attributable to the discontinuation of the one-time requirements approved in 2004 for strengthening security arrangements at the regional disarmament centres (\$121,700) and a decrease of \$100 for furniture and equipment, partially offset by increases in consultancy services on gender-related issues to follow up on the departmental gender action plan (\$20,800) and travel of staff, based on pattern of expenditure (\$15,200).

## D. Programme support

### *Resource requirements (before recosting): \$1,169,400*

- 4.46 The Executive Office provides support services to the Department for Disarmament Affairs in connection with personnel, budgetary and financial administration, resource planning and use of common services, together with administrative support to policymaking organs and other meetings, as required.

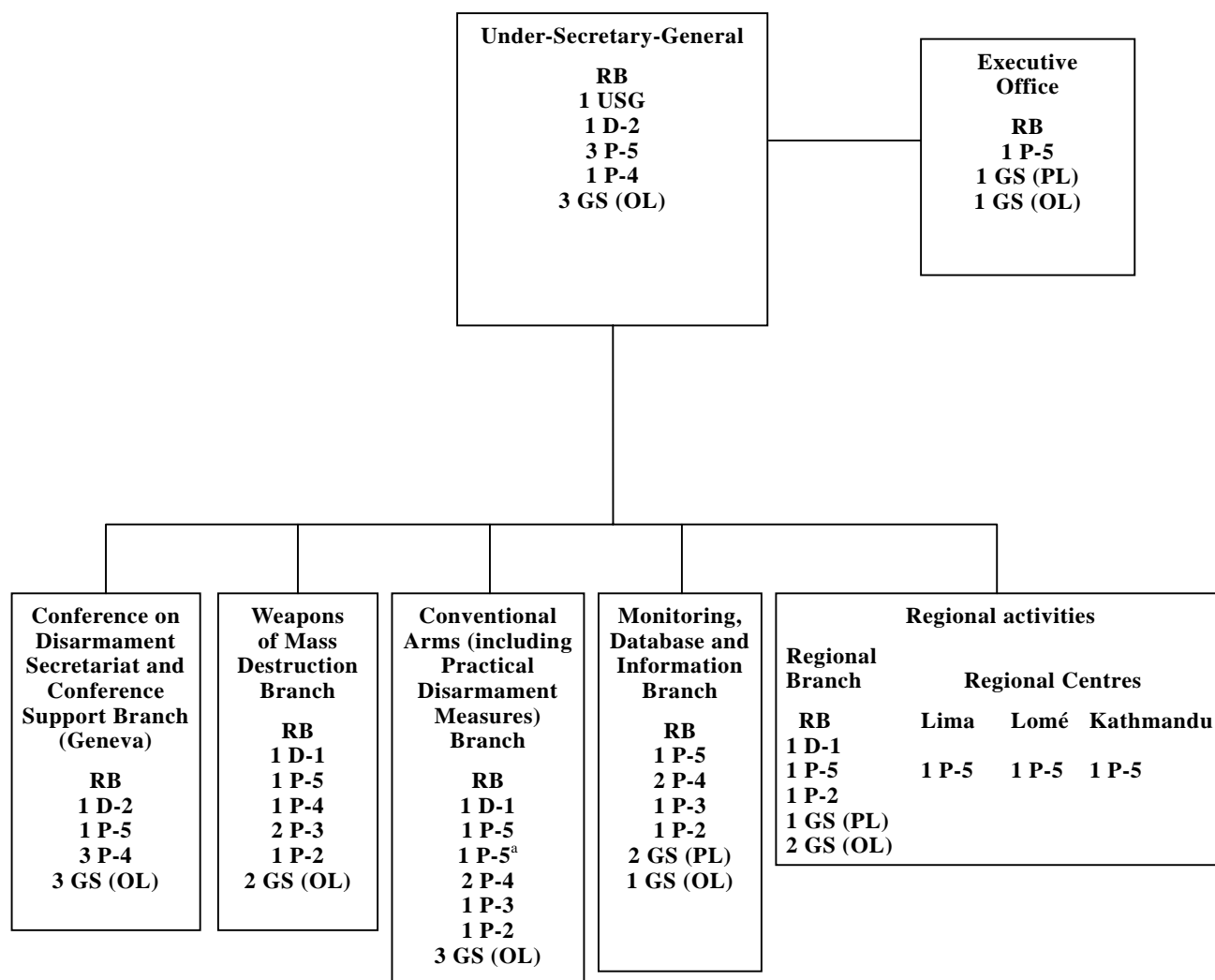

- 4.47 The amount of \$647,500 provides for the continuation of three posts. The non-post resources reflect a growth of \$57,600, relating mainly to general temporary assistance and overtime owing to additional administrative support services required for meetings of the Advisory Board, the Standing Advisory Committee on Security Questions in Central Africa and the other ad hoc expert groups for which the Department is responsible, and the provisions for the departmental share of centrally provided data-processing infrastructure services and support costs, including those for storage area networks, application servers, departmental servers, backup units and desktop connectivity.
