Report of the Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations

**2022 substantive session
(New York, 14 February–11 March 2022)**

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Chapter I

Introduction

1. By its resolution [75/281](#), the General Assembly welcomed the report of the Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations ([A/75/19](#)), decided that the Committee, in accordance with its mandate, would continue its efforts for a comprehensive review of the whole question of peacekeeping operations in all their aspects, review the implementation of its previous proposals and consider any new proposals so as to enhance the capacity of the United Nations to fulfil its responsibilities in that field, and requested the Committee to submit a report on its work to the Assembly at its seventy-sixth session.

Chapter II

Organizational matters

A. Opening and duration of the session

2. The Committee held its substantive session of 2022 at Headquarters from 14 February to 11 March 2022. It held four plenary meetings.

3. The session was opened by the Under-Secretary-General for General Assembly and Conference Management. At the 270th (opening) meeting, on 14 February, a statement was made by the Assistant Secretary-General for Rule of Law and Security Institutions. At the 271st meeting, also on 14 February, the President of the General Assembly addressed the Committee.

4. The Department of Peace Operations, the Department of Operational Support and the Department of Management Strategy, Policy and Compliance provided support to the Committee on substantive issues, while the Disarmament and Peace Affairs Branch of the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management served as the technical secretariat of the Committee.

B. Election of officers

5. At its 270th meeting, the Committee elected the following officers by acclamation:

C. Agenda

6. At the same meeting, the Committee adopted the provisional agenda (A/AC.121/2022/L.1), which read:

7. The Committee also approved its draft programme of work ([A/AC.121/2022/L.2](#)), as well as the modalities for the general debate at its substantive session of 2022 on an exceptional basis, in the light of the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic.

D. Organization of work

8. Also at the same meeting, the Committee decided to establish a working group of the whole, to be chaired by Richard Arbeiter (Canada), to consider the substance of the mandate entrusted to the Committee by the General Assembly.

E. Proceedings of the Committee

10. At its 270th to 272nd meetings, on 14 and 15 February, the Committee held a general debate on a comprehensive review of the whole question of peacekeeping operations in all their aspects. Statements were made by the representatives of Morocco (on behalf of the Non-Aligned Movement), Indonesia (on behalf of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations), Brazil (also on behalf of Argentina, Mexico and Uruguay), Canada (also on behalf of Australia and New Zealand), Djibouti (on behalf of the group of French-speaking ambassadors), the European Union (also on behalf of Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Georgia, Montenegro, North Macedonia, the Republic of Moldova and Ukraine), South Africa, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Jordan, Indonesia, the Dominican Republic, Egypt, Pakistan, Mexico, Argentina, the United States of America, Viet Nam, Cuba, Norway, Côte d'Ivoire, China, Venezuela (Bolivarian Republic of), Israel, Ecuador, India, Guatemala, Thailand, the Philippines, Ethiopia, Bangladesh, Senegal, the Republic of Moldova, Kenya, Turkey, Peru, Uruguay, Costa Rica, Jamaica, Fiji, Bhutan, Nepal, the Republic of Korea, El Salvador, Tunisia, Japan, Switzerland, the Russian Federation, Eritrea, Ireland, Timor-Leste, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Haiti, Lebanon, Rwanda, Iran (Islamic Republic of), Ukraine and Guinea.

11. Statements were also made by the observers for the International Organization of la Francophonie and the African Union.

12. On 18 February, the Working Group of the Whole heard briefings by the Under-Secretary-General for Peace Operations, the Under-Secretary-General for Operational Support and the Under-Secretary-General for Management Strategy, Policy and Compliance, who also engaged in an interactive dialogue with delegations. The Working Group also heard a briefing by and engaged in an interactive dialogue with the Assistant Secretary-General for Europe, Central Asia and the Americas.

13. The Working Group of the Whole and its two sub-working groups met from 22 February to 11 March to consider draft recommendations of the Committee.

Chapter III

Consideration of the draft report of the Working Group

14. At its 273rd meeting, on 11 March, the Special Committee acknowledged that there was no agreement on draft recommendations from the Working Group of the Whole.

Chapter IV

Adoption of the report to the General Assembly at its seventy-sixth session

15. At the same meeting, the Committee adopted its draft report to the General Assembly as introduced by the Rapporteur of the Committee.
