Annotations

1. Election of officers

In accordance with rule 15 of the rules of procedure of the functional commissions of the Economic and Social Council and pursuant to Council resolution 1987/21 and decision 2002/234, the Commission on the Status of Women elects its Bureau for a two-year period. At the 1st meeting of its sixty-sixth session, on 26 March 2021, the Commission elected, by acclamation, Mathu Joyini (South Africa) as Chair of the sixty-sixth and sixty-seventh sessions of the Commission. The Commission also elected, by acclamation, Pilar Eugenio (Argentina) and Guenter Sautter (Germany) as Vice-Chairs for its sixty-sixth and sixty-seventh sessions. At the 2nd meeting of its sixty-sixth session, on 14 March 2022, the Commission elected, by acclamation, Antje Leendertse (Germany) to complete the remaining term of Guenter Sautter (Germany) and Māris Burbergs (Latvia) as Vice-Chairs for its sixty-sixth and sixty-seventh sessions. The Commission postponed the election of the remaining Vice-Chair from the Asia-Pacific States to a later date, on the understanding that, upon nomination by the Asia-Pacific group, the candidate would be invited by the Chair to participate in the meetings of the Bureau to be held in preparation for the sixty-seventh session of the Commission.

In accordance with Economic and Social Council resolution 2009/16, the Commission appoints five of its members to serve a two-year term on the Working Group on Communications on the Status of Women, established in accordance with Economic and Social Council resolution 1983/27. At the 1st meeting of its sixty-sixth session, held on 26 March 2021, the Commission appointed the Russian Federation to serve as a member of the Working Group at its sixty-sixth and sixty-seventh sessions. At its 2nd meeting, on 14 March 2022, the Commission appointed Türkiye* as a member of the Working Group at its sixty-sixth and sixty-seventh sessions.

In the absence of nominations from the African States, the Asia-Pacific States and the Latin American and Caribbean States, the Commission postponed the appointment of the remaining three members of the Working Group on Communications to a later date, on the understanding that, upon endorsement by their respective Groups, the endorsed members of the Commission would be allowed to participate fully in the proceedings of the Working Group. At the 2nd meeting of its sixty-seventh session, the Commission will be called upon to appoint the remaining members of the Working Group.

2. Adoption of the agenda and other organizational matters

Rule 7 of the rules of procedure provides that the Commission, at the beginning of each session, shall adopt the agenda of that session.

The provisional agenda and documentation for the sixty-seventh session of the Commission were approved by the Economic and Social Council in its decision 2022/325.

Preparations for the sixty-seventh session of the Commission were made in accordance with Economic and Social Council resolution 2022/4 on the future organization and methods of work of the Commission on the Status of Women. Accordingly, the Bureau of the Commission held several meetings as well as informal briefings and consultations with delegations to consider the organization of work for the session.

Following past practice, statements delivered by representatives of delegations of members and observers of the Commission during the general discussion shall be

limited to 5 minutes, and statements made on behalf of groups of delegations to 10 minutes. It is also recommended that interventions from non-governmental organizations on themes relevant to the session be integrated into the general discussion and the interactive dialogues, taking into consideration geographical balance.

3. **Follow-up to the Fourth World Conference on Women and to the twenty-third special session of the General Assembly, entitled “Women 2000: gender equality, development and peace for the twenty-first century”**
 - (a) **Implementation of strategic objectives and action in critical areas of concern and further actions and initiatives:**
 - (i) **Priority theme: innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age for achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls;**
 - (ii) **Review theme: challenges and opportunities in achieving gender equality and the empowerment of rural women and girls.**

In its resolution [2020/15](#), the Economic and Social Council decided that, at its sixty-seventh session, in 2023, the Commission would consider as its priority theme “Innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age for achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls” and also decided that it would consider as its review theme “Challenges and opportunities in achieving gender equality and the empowerment of rural women and girls”, in follow-up to the agreed conclusions adopted by the Commission at its sixty-second session (see [E/2018/27-E/CN.6/2018/20](#)).

In its resolution [2022/4](#), the Council decided that the session of the Commission would include a ministerial segment to reaffirm and strengthen political commitment to the realization of gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls as well as their human rights and to ensure high-level engagement and the visibility of the deliberations of the Commission and that the segment would include ministerial round tables or other high-level interactive dialogues to exchange experiences, lessons learned and good practices, as well as a general discussion on the follow-up to the Fourth World Conference on Women and to the twenty-third special session of the General Assembly. The Council recommended that statements identify goals attained, achievements made and efforts under way to close gaps and meet challenges in relation to the priority theme and the review theme.

Also in its resolution [2022/4](#), the Council decided that the Commission would, at each session, evaluate progress in the implementation of the agreed conclusions on a priority theme of a previous session, as its review theme, through an interactive dialogue that would include:

- (a) Member States of different regions, on a voluntary basis, presenting their lessons learned, challenges and best practices that identified means for accelerated implementation through national and regional experiences;
- (b) Ways to support and achieve accelerated implementation, including through addressing data gaps and challenges in the enhanced collection, reporting, use and analysis of data with regard to the theme, at the national, regional and global levels.

Ministerial segment

The Ministerial segment of the Commission will be held from 6 to 9 March 2023 and will include four ministerial round tables.

Interactive expert panel on the priority theme

The Commission will hold one interactive expert panel with the participation of experts from Governments, representatives of civil society and other stakeholder groups that work on the priority theme.

Interactive dialogues on the review theme

The Commission will hold two interactive dialogues with voluntary presentations by Member States from different regions on the review theme.

Interactive dialogue among youth representatives on the priority theme

The Commission will hold one interactive dialogue on the priority theme to facilitate exchanges among youth representatives from delegations of Member States, which will be open to all Member States.

(b) Emerging issues, trends, focus areas and new approaches to questions affecting the situation of women, including equality between women and men

In its resolution [2022/4](#), the Economic and Social Council decided that the Commission would, as necessary, continue to discuss emerging issues, trends, focus areas and new approaches to questions affecting the situation of women and girls, that require timely consideration, taking into account developments at the global and regional levels as well as planned activities within the United Nations, where increased attention to gender perspectives is required, and with attention to relevant issues on the agenda of the Council, in particular its annual main theme, as applicable.

In the same resolution, the Council requested the Bureau of the Commission, prior to the session, to identify such an emerging issue, trend, focus area or new approach, in consultation with all Member States, through their regional groups, and taking into account inputs from other relevant stakeholders, for consideration by the Commission through an interactive dialogue.

In accordance with resolution [2022/4](#), the Bureau of the Commission, following consultations prior to the session, identified the theme “Getting back on track: achieving gender equality in a context of overlapping emergencies” as the emerging issue for the sixty-seventh session.

(c) Gender mainstreaming, situations and programmatic matters*Normative aspects of the work of the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women*

In accordance with paragraph 67 (c) of General Assembly resolution [64/289](#), the Commission will have before it the annual report of the Under-Secretary-General/

Executive Director of the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women (UN-Women) on the normative aspects of the work of UN-Women and on its implementation of the policy guidance provided by the Commission.

Violence against women

In its resolution [50/166](#) on the role of the former United Nations Development Fund for Women (now UN-Women) in eliminating violence against women, the General Assembly requested the Fund to include in its regular reports information on the establishment of a trust fund in support of national, regional and international actions to eliminate violence against women and to provide such information to the Commission.

Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women

In accordance with article 21.2 of the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women, the reports of the Committee on the Elimination of Discrimination against Women are transmitted to the Commission for its information.

Programme matters

The proposed programme of work of UN-Women for 2024, under programme 14, Gender equality and empowerment of women, is under preparation.

4. Communications concerning the status of women

In its resolution [76 \(V\)](#), the Economic and Social Council established a procedure by which the Commission would receive and consider communications relating to the status of women. In its resolution [304 I \(XI\)](#), the Council amended resolution [76 \(V\)](#) and requested the Secretary-General to compile, before each session of the Commission, a list of confidential and non-confidential communications, containing a brief indication of the substance of each communication.

In its resolution [1983/27](#), the Council reaffirmed the mandate of the Commission to consider confidential and non-confidential communications on the status of women and authorized the Commission to appoint a working group to consider such communications and prepare a report thereon for the Commission.

In its resolution 1993/11, the Council reaffirmed that the Commission was empowered to make recommendations to the Council on what action should be taken on emerging trends and patterns of discrimination against women revealed by such communications.

In its decision 2002/235, the Council decided, in order to make the communications procedure of the Commission more effective and efficient:

(a) That the Commission, starting at its forty-seventh session, should appoint, at each session, the members of the Working Group on Communications on the Status of Women for the next session so that the members would be able to meet to enable the Secretariat to issue their report three working days before the adoption of the agenda by the Commission;

(b) To request the Secretary-General:

(i) To inform Governments about each communication pertaining to them that would be considered by the Commission and give them at least 12 weeks before the consideration of such communications by the Working Group;

(ii) To ensure that the members of the Working Group receive in advance the lists of communications, including replies from Governments, if any, to be taken into account in preparing its report for examination by the Commission.

In its resolution 2009/16, the Economic and Social Council decided that the Commission, starting at its fifty-fourth session, should appoint the members of the Working Group on Communications on the Status of Women for a two-year period.

5. Follow-up to Economic and Social Council resolutions and decisions

In accordance with General Assembly resolution [75/290 A](#), the Economic and Social Council, at its coordination segment, will address issues identified by subsidiary bodies as requiring the attention of the Council at the global level and to build on the policy conclusions of its subsidiary bodies, along with inputs of the United Nations system, so as to promote the balanced integration of the three dimensions of sustainable development.

The theme of the Economic and Social Council and the high-level political forum on sustainable development for 2023 will be “Accelerating the recovery from the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) and the full implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development at all levels”.

In accordance with rule 9 of the rules of procedure of the functional commissions of the Council, the Commission will have before it a draft provisional agenda for its sixty-eighth session, including the list of documents to be submitted for its consideration.

7. Adoption of the report of the Commission on its sixty-seventh session

In accordance with rule 37 of the rules of procedure of the functional commissions of the Council, the Commission shall submit to the Council a report on the work of its sixty-seventh session.
