### PROPOSED PROGRAMME BUDGET FOR THE BIENNIUM 1996-1997

REVIEW OF THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS AND DECISIONS  
ADOPTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AT ITS TENTH SPECIAL SESSION:  
ADVISORY BOARD ON DISARMAMENT MATTERS; AND UNITED NATIONS  
INSTITUTE FOR DISARMAMENT RESEARCH

Request for a subvention to the Institute resulting from the  
recommendations of the Board of Trustees of the United  
Nations Institute for Disarmament Research contained in  
document A/50/416

#### Note by the Secretary-General

1. In accordance with the provisions of paragraph 3 of article VIII of the statute of the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR), 1/ the recommendation by the Board of Trustees of the Institute that the current subvention of \$220,000 from the regular budget of the United Nations be retained for 1996, is hereby transmitted to the General Assembly for approval.

2. The Advisory Board on Disarmament Matters, in its capacity as Board of Trustees of UNIDIR, adopted the work programme for 1996 and beyond and the 1996 estimated expenditures of the Institute (A/50/416, annex II). The Board noted that in 1995 the subvention from the United Nations was about 15 to 20 per cent of the income the Institute received from voluntary sources, a very low percentage relative to the normal "matching grants" system enjoyed by many institutes world wide. The subvention is considered a decisive element of the Institute's funding since restrictions are not applied against use of it, as is often the case with the Institute's other sources of funding (voluntary contributions from Member States and research grants from foundations) which are usually "tied" or "earmarked". Although voluntary contributions from Member States and research grants from foundations, registered an increase of \$164,400

in 1995 over the previous year, the Board reached agreement that a subvention of \$400,000 from the United Nations would be required to support the Institute adequately and to allow it the flexibility to assume tasks desired by Member States. Members of the Board would meanwhile encourage donors to be as "open-ended" as possible with their voluntary contributions.

3. The proposed programme budget of the United Nations for the biennium 1996-1997 2/ contains under section 2, Political affairs, a provision of \$440,000 proposed as a grant, representing the United Nations subvention to UNIDIR for 1996-1997. The Board noted that if the financial situation of the United Nations makes it impossible to increase the subvention, the current annual subvention of \$220,000 from the regular budget of the United Nations must be retained at all cost for 1996. Notwithstanding the inclusion of the necessary provision in the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1996-1997, a formal request for a subvention for 1996 of \$220,000 is being submitted to the General Assembly in keeping with established procedure.

4. Should the General Assembly decide to approve the recommendation of the Board of Trustees of UNIDIR, no additional appropriation would be required under section 2, Political affairs, of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1996-1997.

5. In accordance with section IV of General Assembly resolution 44/201 B of 21 December 1989, entitled "Subvention from the regular budget to the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research", the Secretary-General is requested, inter alia, "to report annually to the General Assembly on the situation of the Institute". In this connection it should be noted that the financial situation of the Institute is as follows:

(a) Funds available at the beginning of 1995 amounted to \$584,100, including the operating cash reserve of \$133,500, associated with 1994;

(b) Total income estimated for 1995 from voluntary contributions (\$881,800), foundation support (\$322,900), interest (\$25,000), miscellaneous sources (\$15,000), including income from sales of UNIDIR publications, and the subvention from the United Nations regular budget (\$220,000) is estimated at \$1,464,700. The estimate reflects an increase of \$436,100 over the estimates provided in 1994, owing mainly to an increase in voluntary contributions and foundation support. The details of 1995 and 1996 contributions are provided in annexes I and II to the present document;

(c) Total 1995 estimated expenditure is \$1,484,000, which includes a provision of \$60,200 for programme support costs. Requirements for 1996 are estimated at \$1,049,700, inclusive of \$39,500 for programme support costs. The breakdown of 1995 revised estimated expenditures and the 1996 estimates is provided in annex III to the present document;

(d) Available funds at the end of 1995 are estimated at \$246,600, including an operating reserve of \$189,600.
